ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Earned a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution
- Official transcripts from all institutions attended
- Undergraduate GPA of 3.0 or greater
- ATI TEAS composite score of 70 or higher (*taken within the last year*)
- Provide one recommendation form
 - A letter of reference to accompany the recommendation form is strongly encouraged
- Completion of two short essay questions on the application
- Completed (or be near completion of) all nursing pre-requisite courses.

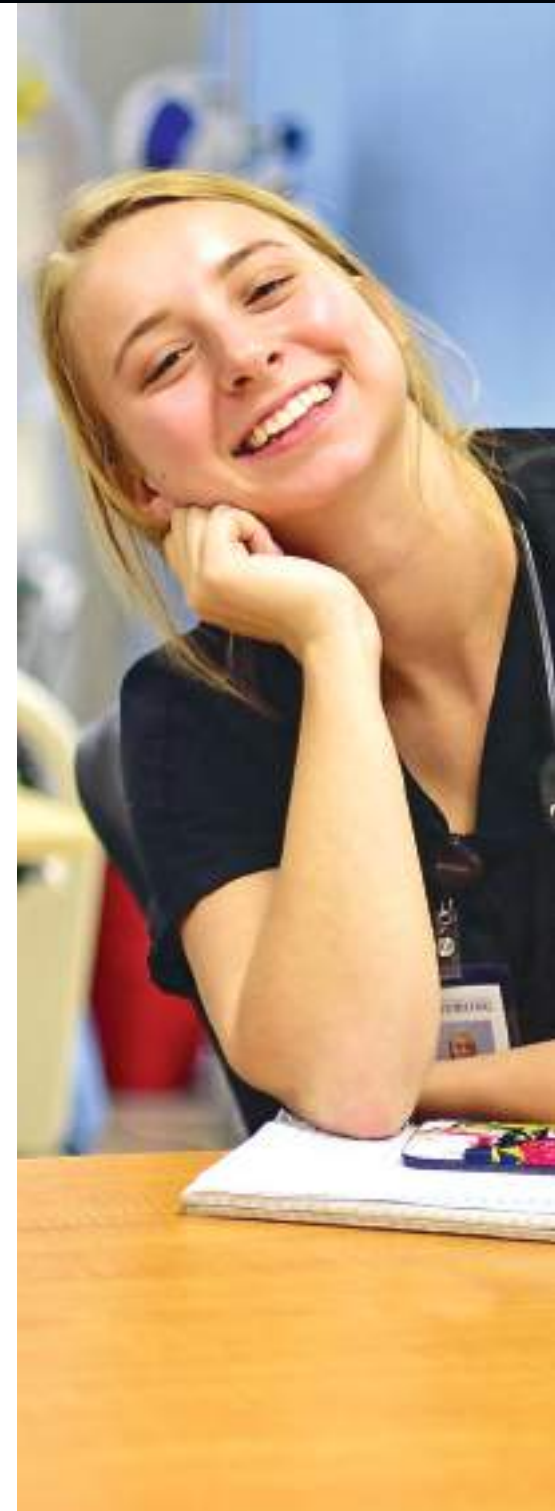
